How do we find words for a "dark" experience.... or is it really dark? In this weekend retreat, St. John of the Cross charts the fundamental journey of the human spirit where no words can satisfy. The dark night is a metaphor and often misunderstood.



The Night of Sense and Night of Spirit provide an interior landscape of the soul that

presents the human experience of being wounded and simultaneously, the experience of being healed by the divine physician.

The "dark nights" are an amazing story of human development aided by grace as told in these images and provides inspired insight into our contemporary contemplative spiritual journey.

Who is John of the Cross?

John of the Cross (1542-1591) was a 16th Century Spanish mystic, Carmelite priest, author, teacher, poet, and beloved friend of St. Teresa of Avila and Doctor of the Universal Church.

Today, many people still turn to John for guidance in the critical "dark night" of life. He was not only a great mystic and outstanding spiritual guide, but well known for his extraordinary relationship and experience of God as expressed in his classic poem "The Living Flame of Love." He is well-worthy of the title "mystical doctor."
